





# WE'RE BETTER TOGETHER: A MESSAGE FROM THE LEADERSHIP TEAM

IT IS AMAZING WHAT WE CAN ACCOMPLISH TOGETHER! Thank you to all of our friends and supporters who choose to give through the Center for Arab American Philanthropy (CAAP). Whether it is through a donor-advised fund that helps you be a more effective philanthropist; CAAP's disaster relief fund, which raised support in 2013 for Syrian refugees; a giving circle that provides a fun way to combine your giving with friends; or one of CAAP's various other grantmaking programs, we're truly better together. When you give to causes that matter to you through CAAP – whether you give \$10 or \$10,000 – you are helping to tell a positive story of Arab American generosity through the collective power of philanthropy. Thanks to you, CAAP had much to be proud of in fiscal year 2013:

- CAAP reached a milestone of granting \$1 million since 2009 through its community grantmaking, donor-advised funds, Teen Grantmaking Initiative (TGI) and disaster relief philanthropy.
- With the partnership of the American Syrian Arab Cultural Association, more than 75 people gave to CAAP's Syria Humanitarian Relief Campaign, granting nearly \$160,000 to six humanitarian organizations providing aid to refugees. Gifts between \$100–\$2,500 were matched by CAAP at 25 cents to the dollar, generating a bigger impact.
- CAAP partnered with the National Network for Arab American Communities (NNAAC), a project of ACCESS, and granted \$45,000 to three NNAAC member organizations to support their advocacy and civic engagement work. Funding for this grant opportunity was provided by the Ford Foundation.
- Thanks to funds raised through a donation match challenge through the C.S. Mott Foundation, CAAP now houses seven endowed funds and increased endowed assets by \$100,000 in less than one year.
- The Teen Grantmaking Initiative (TGI) program launched a second chapter in Brooklyn, NY in partnership with the Arab American Association of New York (AAANY).

#### The U.S. Fund for UNICEF


Disaster Relief Fund Grantee

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) works in more than 190 countries and territories to save and improve children's lives, providing health care and immunizations, clean water and sanitation, nutrition, education, emergency relief and more. The U.S. Fund for UNICEF, a CAAP grantee through its Syria Humanitarian Relief Campaign, supports UNICEF's work through fundraising, advocacy and education in the United States. UNICEF is committed to help meet the needs of Syrian children and families, whether inside Syria or in their countries of refuge. The assistance provided by UNICEF and its partners is reaching thousands of Syrians. #### Mizna

#### Community Grantmaking Grantee

Mizna is a St. Paul, Minn.—based arts organization, founded in 1999 as a platform for Arab American literature, film and art. For a community often vilified and discriminated against, Mizna works with the knowledge that the most powerful way to combat negative stereotypes is to portray Arab Americans in nuanced and beautiful ways. Mizna challenges thinking about Arab Americans through presentation of non-stereotyped images and promoting the work of Arab artists who create political and non-political work. In 2014, Mizna will be publishing the 28th issue of its literary journal, Mizna: Prose, Poetry and Art Exploring Arab America, with a special theme of "Eating the Other," delving into the unexpected in food and culture—creativity, politics and appropriation. #### The Glimmerglass Festival

**Donor-Advised Fund Grantee** 

The Glimmerglass Festival is a professional, nonprofit opera and musical theater company that presents four new productions in rotation every July and August. The company's Alice Busch Opera Theater is set on Otsego Lake in Cooperstown, NY., and has been home to more than 100 productions, many of which have been world and professional premieres. Mainstage performances are supplemented by special concerts, a discussion series and free events, including question-and-answer sessions with casts and backstage tours. The 2014 festival focuses on 100 years of music and features new productions of Puccini's *Madame Butterfly*, Rodgers and Hammerstein's *Carousel*, Strauss' *Ariadne in Naxos* and Tobias Picker's *An American Tragedy*. #### **Lebanese American University**

What began as the first school for girls in the Middle East, Lebanese American University (LAU) has grown into a large academic center with campuses in Beirut and Byblos, Lebanon, as well as new headquarters and an academic center in New York City. The year 2013 marked a number of milestones for LAU, with the first class of students graduating from the Gilbert and Rose-Marie Chagoury Medical School and Alice Ramez Chagoury School of Nursing. LAU's School of Pharmacy is, meanwhile, the only school outside of the United States to be accredited by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE). In September, LAU launched its bachelor's degree program in fashion design in collaboration with internationally-renowned Lebanese designer Elie Saab – the first degree program of its kind in the Middle East. # TEEN GRANTMAKING INITIATIVE

There's nothing more potent than young

#### THAT IS WHAT CAAP's Teen Grantmaking Initiative (TGI) is all about. These passionate youth learn about issues affecting their peers, solicit proposals from local community nonprofits, fundraise thousands of dollars each year, and then decide where to grant their money to make the most impact. So far, more than 50 youth have participated in the TGI program and, to date, have granted nearly \$10,000 to their community. TGI grantmaking supports various efforts, including a program supporting at-risk young mothers, after-school enrichment for low-income youth, and a youth-led drug prevention program. With the launch of a new TGI chapter

in Brooklyn, NY, CAAP's vision of developing a connected network of young Arab American philanthropists is becoming a reality.

FOUNDED IN 1963, Starfish Family Services is a community-based nonprofit organization, serving thousands of vulnerable children and families annually in metro Detroit. The organization's passion is early childhood development. It strives every day to prepare young children for a successful start to school and life. Starfish's programs and services uniquely recognize and respect the important role of parents and caregivers in the long-term success of children as well. The organization provides more than 1,000 children, up to the age of 5, and their families with an array of services including: prenatal support, preschool education, home visits, parenting education, and access to basic needs and mental health services.


Thanks to a grant from TGI, Starfish's Baby Power program was able to reach 19 teen mothers in Inkster, MI, with support to assist them in improving their parenting skills, emotional health and mombaby relationships. For these moms, raising babies can be very difficult. 

(OCT. 1, 2012 - SEPT. 30, 2013)


#### TOTAL GRANTMAKING BY ORGANIZATION TYPE
